

REVISED JOINT PROCLAMATION OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE HAYWOOD COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS, THE MAYORS OF THE TOWNS OF CANTON, CLYDE, WAYNESVILLE AND MAGGIE VALLEY IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT COORDINATOR AND IN CONSULATION WITH THE HAYWOOD COUNTY PUBLIC HEALTH DIRECTOR

RESTRICTING MOVEMENT OF ALL INDIVIDUALS LIVING WITHIN HAYWOOD COUNTY, AND THE TOWNS OF CANTON, CLYDE, WAYNESVILLE AND MAGGIE VALLEY TO STAY AT THEIR PLACE OF RESIDENCE EXCEPT THAT THEY MAY LEAVE TO PROVIDE OR RECEIVE CERTAIN ESSENTIAL SERVICES OR ENGAGE IN CERTAIN ESSENTIAL ACTIVITIES AND WORK FOR ESSENTIAL BUSINESSES AND GOVERNMENTAL SERVICES;

RESTRICTING ALL BUSINESSES AND GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES TO CEASE NON-ESSENTIAL OPERATIONS REQUIRING PUBLIC MOBILITY WITHIN THE LOCATIONS WITHIN THE COUNTY; RESTRICTING ALL NON-ESSENTIAL GATHERINGS OF INDIVIDUALS; AND ALL NON-ESSENTIAL TRAVEL

WHEREAS, The North Carolina General Assembly has adopted Article 1A of Chapter 166A of the General Statutes, entitled "North Carolina Emergency Management Act", which sets forth the authority and responsibility of the Governor, State agencies, and local governments in prevention of, preparation for, response to, and recovery from natural or man-made emergencies; and

WHEREAS, G.S. §166A-19.22, which is part of the North Carolina Emergency Management Act, authorizes counties to declare a state of emergency under conditions and following procedures contained in G.S. §166A-19.22; and

WHEREAS, the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic has created a state of emergency in the County of Haywood and the four towns located within the county; and

WHEREAS, the Governor has declared a state of emergency on behalf of the state of North Carolina on March 10, 2020; and

WHEREAS, Haywood County in conjunction with the four towns within the County issued a Proclamation of Emergency on March 15, 2020; and

WHEREAS, scientific evidence and best practices regarding the most effective approaches to slow the transmission of communicable diseases generally and COVID-19 particularly, and evidence that age, condition and health of a significant portion of the population of the County and the towns places the population at risk of serious health complications, including death from COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, this Proclamation addresses the "Essential Critical Infrastructure Workforce" and restrictions and those exceptions to the restrictions on Haywood County residents and those who work in Haywood County. The categories of essential services and business addressed in this order include healthcare and public health; law enforcement, public safety and first responders; food and agriculture; energy; water and wastewater; transportation and logistics; public works; communication and information technology; other community-

based government operations and essential functions, including human services; other community- based human service operations; critical manufacturing; and hazardous materials as defined in the "Memorandum on Identification of Essential Critical Infrastructure Workers during COVID- 19 Response" from US Department of Homeland Security; and

WHEREAS, many individuals who contract the virus display no symptoms or have mild symptoms which means they may not be aware they carry the virus. People without symptoms can transmit the disease and because evidence shows the disease is easily spread, mass gatherings can result in further transmissions of the virus; and

WHEREAS, it is essential to slow viral transmission as much as possible to protect the most vulnerable and to prevent the health care system from being overwhelmed; and

WHEREAS, this Revised Order and Proclamation is necessary to slow the rate of the spread and is the least restrictive based upon the current evidence.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED THAT:

This Joint Proclamation is to ensure that the maximum number of people self-isolate in their places of residence to the maximum extent feasible, while enabling essential services to continue to slow the spread of COVID-19 to the maximum extent possible. When people need to leave their places of residence, whether to obtain or perform essential services, or to otherwise facilitate authorized activities necessary for continuity of social and commercial life, they should at all times reasonably comply with CDC recommendations of Social Distancing Requirements of at least six (6) feet apart. Individuals whose residences are unsafe or become unsafe, such as victims of domestic violence, are permitted and urged to leave their home and stay at a safe alternative location. For purposes of this Proclamation, homes or residences include hotels, motels, shared rental units, shelters, campgrounds and similar facilities. All provisions of this Proclamation should be interpreted to effectuate this intent.

All individuals currently living within Haywood County and the named Towns are restricted to shelter at their places of residence. All persons may leave their residences only for Essential Activities, Essential Governmental Functions, to operate Essential Business (as defined below) or as otherwise defined in this Proclamation. All Essential Businesses are strongly encouraged to remain open. To the greatest extent feasible, Essential Businesses shall comply with Social Distancing requirements as defined by CDC.

Non-essential business and operations must cease. All businesses and operations in the County, except Essential Businesses and Operations as defined below, are to cease all activities within the County except Minimum Basic Operations, as defined below. Businesses may continue operations consisting exclusively of employees or contractors performing activities at their own residences (i.e., working from home).

Prohibited activities. All public and private gatherings of more than 10 people are prohibited, except for the limited purposes permitted by this Proclamation. Nothing herein prohibits the gathering of members of a household or residence.

All places of public amusement where people may gather, whether indoors or outdoors, including but not limited to, locations with amusement rides, carnivals, zoos, museums, arcades, fairs, children's play centers, playgrounds, recreation centers, funplexes, theme parks, bowling alleys, movie and other theaters, concert and music halls, and country clubs or social clubs shall be closed to the public. Team and contact sports, whether held indoors or outdoors, are prohibited.

Restrictions on nursing homes, long term care facilities and assisted living facilities operated pursuant to Article 6 of NC General Statute Chapter 131E.

- a. Owners, administrators, operators, staff, contractors, and volunteers of nursing homes, long term care and assisted living facilities are prohibited from allowing residents, customers, clients, or visitors from assembly in spaces that do not permit appropriate social distancing which consists of separation of 6 feet or more between each individual.
- b. Owners, administrators, operators, staff, contractors, and volunteers of nursing homes, long term care and assisted living facilities are prohibited from allowing a person to enter the facility and visit a resident unless each of the following criteria are met: (1) the visitor is an adult, (2) the resident has not already had a visitor that day; and (3) the visit takes place in the resident's room. This prohibition does not apply to end-of-life situations.
- c. No person is allowed to visit a resident of a nursing home, long term care or assisted living facility unless the visitor has been screened prior to entry for signs and symptoms of COVID-19 including the following: fever of 100.4 or higher, cough, or difficulty breathing, contact in past 14 days with a person who has a confirmed diagnosis of COVID-19 or who is under investigation for COVID-19. All visitors may be required to take precautionary measures including, but not limited to, social distancing or wearing personal protective equipment.
- d. No person is allowed to visit a resident of a nursing home, long term care or an assisted living facility unless the visitor shows identification, signs into a visitor's log that includes the date and time in and time out, and provide their name and contact information including phone number and email if available.
- e. Operators and staff of nursing homes, long term care and assisted living facilities are prohibited from destroying each day's visitor log for a period of 30 days from that day.
- f. Owners, administrators and operators shall ensure adequate staffing to manage all occupants of the facility to include lifting and moving uninjured occupants.
- g. Shall CDC guidance for facilities described in this section change, the restrictions imposed by Haywood County will change automatically and accordingly.

Prohibited and permitted travel. All travel, including, but not limited to, travel by automobile,

motorcycle, scooter, train, plane, or public transit, except Essential Travel and Essential Activities as defined herein or otherwise defined in this Proclamation, is prohibited. People riding on public transit must comply with Social Distancing Requirements to the greatest extent feasible.

This Proclamation allows travel into or out of the County for Essential Activities and to maintain Essential Businesses and Operations and Minimum Basic Operations.

1. **Leaving the home for essential activities is permitted.** For purposes of this Proclamation, individuals may leave their residence only to perform any of the following Essential Activities:
 - a. **For health and safety.** To engage in activities or perform tasks essential to their health and safety, or to the health and safety of their family or household members (including, but not limited to, pets), such as, by way of example only and without limitation, seeking emergency services, obtaining medical supplies or medication, or visiting a health care professional for medical services that cannot be provided by electronic means.
 - b. **For necessary supplies and services.** To obtain necessary services or supplies for themselves and their family or household members, or to deliver those services or supplies to others, such as, by way of example only and without limitation, groceries and food, household consumer products, supplies they need to work from home, and products necessary to maintain the safety, sanitation, and essential operation of residences.
 - c. **For outdoor activity.** To engage in outdoor activity, provided the individuals comply with Social Distancing Requirements, as defined herein, such as, by way of example and without limitation, walking, hiking, golfing, running, cycling, fishing or using the greenways. Individuals may go to public parks and open outdoor recreation areas while maintaining Social Distancing Requirements. However, playgrounds may increase spread of COVID-19, and therefore shall be closed.
 - d. **For certain types of work.** To perform work providing essential products and services at Essential Businesses or Operations (which, as defined below, includes Healthcare and Public Health Operations, Human Services Operations, Essential Governmental Functions, and Essential Infrastructure) or to otherwise carry out activities specifically permitted in this Proclamation, including Minimum Basic Operations.
 - e. **To take care of others.** To care for a family member, friend, or pet in another household, and to transport family members, friends, or pets as allowed by this Executive Order.
2. **Elderly people and those who are vulnerable** as a result of illness should take additional

precautions. People at high risk of severe illness from COVID-19, including elderly people and those who are sick, are urged to stay in their residence to the extent possible except as necessary to seek medical care. Nothing in this Proclamation prevents the Haywood County Public Health Director from issuing and enforcing isolation and quarantine orders or executing other duties as required pursuant to NCGS 130A.

3. **Healthcare and Public Health Operations.** For purposes of this Proclamation, individuals may leave their residence to work for or obtain services through Healthcare and Public Health Operations.

Healthcare and Public Health Operations includes, but is not limited to: hospitals; clinics when medical/dental care cannot be provided virtually; pharmacies; public health entities, including those that compile, model, analyze and communicate public health information; pharmaceutical, pharmacy, medical device and equipment, and biotechnology companies (including operations, research and development, manufacture, and supply chain); organizations collecting blood, platelets, plasma, and other necessary materials; reproductive health care providers; home healthcare services providers; mental health and substance use providers; other healthcare facilities and suppliers and providers of any related and/or ancillary healthcare services; and entities that transport and dispose of medical materials and the remains of the dead.

Specifically included in Healthcare and Public Health Operations are manufacturers, technicians, logistics, and warehouse operators and distributors of medical equipment, personal protective equipment (PPE), medical gases, pharmaceuticals, blood and blood products, vaccines, testing materials, laboratory supplies, cleaning, sanitizing, disinfecting or sterilization supplies, and tissue and paper towel products.

Healthcare and Public Health Operations also includes veterinary care and all urgent healthcare services provided to animals.

Healthcare and Public Health Operations shall be construed broadly to avoid any impacts to the delivery of healthcare, broadly defined. Healthcare and Public Health Operations does not include fitness and exercise gyms, spas, salons, barber shops, tattoo parlors, and similar facilities.

4. **Human Services Operations.** For purposes of this Proclamation, individuals may leave their residence to work for or obtain services that are not available via online or mail-in applications, and telephone interviews at any Human Services Operations, or Medicaid providers that are providing services to the public and including state-operated, institutional, or community-based settings providing human services to the public.

Human Services Operations include, but is not limited to: long-term care facilities; residential settings and shelters for adults, seniors, children, and/or people with developmental disabilities,

intellectual disabilities, substance use disorders, and/or mental illness; transitional facilities; home-based settings to provide services to individuals with physical, intellectual, and/or developmental disabilities, seniors, adults, and children; field offices that provide and help to determine eligibility for basic needs including food, cash assistance, medical coverage, child care, vocational services, rehabilitation services; developmental centers; adoption agencies; businesses that provide food, shelter, and social services, and other necessities of life for economically disadvantaged individuals, individuals with physical, intellectual, and/or developmental disabilities, or otherwise needy individuals.

Human Services Operations shall be construed broadly to avoid any impacts to the delivery of human services, broadly defined.

5. **Essential Infrastructure.** For purposes of this Proclamation, individuals may leave their residence to provide any services or perform any work necessary to offer, provision, operate, maintain and repair Essential Infrastructure.

Essential Infrastructure includes, but is not limited to: food production, distribution, and sale; construction (including, but not limited to, construction required in response to this public health emergency, hospital construction, construction of long-term care facilities, public works construction, and housing construction); building management and maintenance; airport operations; operation and maintenance of utilities, including water, sewer, and gas; electrical (including power generation, distribution, and production of raw materials); distribution centers; security system operation and maintenance; oil and biofuel refining; roads, highways, railroads, and public transportation; ports; cybersecurity operations; flood control; solid waste and recycling collection and removal; and internet, video, and telecommunications systems (including the provision of essential global, national, and local infrastructure for computing services, business infrastructure, communications, and web-based services).

Essential Infrastructure shall be construed broadly to avoid any impacts to essential infrastructure, broadly defined.

6. **Essential Governmental Functions.** For purposes of this Proclamation, all first responders, emergency management personnel, emergency dispatchers, court personnel, law enforcement and corrections personnel, hazardous materials responders, child protection and child welfare personnel, adult protection services, housing and shelter personnel, military, and other governmental employees working for or to support Essential Businesses and Operations are categorically exempt.

Essential Government Functions means all services provided by the County or any municipality, township, subdivision or agency of government and needed to ensure the continuing operation of the government agencies or to provide for or support the health, safety and welfare of the public, and including contractors performing Essential Government Functions. Each County, City or Town Manager shall determine its Essential Governmental Functions and identify employees

and/or contractors necessary to the performance of those functions.

This Proclamation does not apply to the NC State or federal government. Nothing herein shall prohibit any individual from performing or accessing Essential Governmental Functions.

7. **Businesses covered by this Proclamation.** For the purposes of this Proclamation, covered businesses include any for-profit, non-profit, or educational entities, regardless of the nature of the service, the function it performs, or its corporate or entity structure.

Essential Businesses and Operations. For purposes of this Proclamation, Essential Businesses and Operations means Healthcare and Public Health Operations, Human Services Operations, Essential Governmental Functions, and Essential Infrastructure, and the following:

1. **Stores that sell groceries and medicine.** Grocery stores, pharmacies, certified farmers' markets, farm and produce stands, supermarkets, convenience stores, and other establishments engaged in the retail sale of groceries, canned food, dry goods, frozen foods, fresh fruits and vegetables, pet supplies, fresh meats, fish, and poultry, alcohol and nonalcoholic beverages and any other household consumer products (such as cleaning and personal care products). This includes stores that sell groceries, medicine, including medication not requiring a medical prescription, and also that sell other non-grocery products, and products necessary to maintaining the safety, sanitation, and essential operation of residences and Essential Businesses and Operations;
2. **Food, beverage, and agriculture.** Food and beverage manufacturing, production, processing, and cultivation, including farming, livestock, fishing, baking, and other production agriculture, including cultivation, marketing, production, and distribution of animals and goods for consumption; and businesses that provide food, shelter, and other necessities of life for animals, including animal shelters, rescues, shelters, kennels, adoption facilities and groomers;
3. **Organizations that provide charitable and social services.** Businesses and religious and secular nonprofit organizations, including food banks, when providing food, shelter, and social services, and other necessities of life for economically disadvantaged or otherwise needy individuals, individuals who need assistance as a result of this emergency, and people with disabilities;
4. **Media.** Newspapers, television, radio, and other media services;
5. **Gas stations and businesses needed for transportation.** Gas stations and auto-supply, auto-repair, and related facilities and bicycle shops and related facilities;
6. **Financial institutions.** Banks, currency exchanges, consumer lenders, including but not

limited to, pawnbrokers, consumer installment lenders and sales finance lenders, credit unions, appraisers, title companies, financial markets, trading and futures exchanges, affiliates of financial institutions, entities that issue bonds, related financial institutions, and institutions selling financial products;

7. Hardware and supply stores. Hardware stores and businesses that sell electrical, plumbing, and heating material;
8. Critical trades. Building and Construction workers, and other trades including but not limited to plumbers, electricians, exterminators, cleaning and janitorial staff for commercial and governmental properties, security staff, operating engineers, HVAC, painting, moving and relocation services, and other service providers who provide services that are necessary to maintaining the safety, sanitation, and essential operation of residences, Essential Activities, and Essential Businesses and Operations;
9. Mail, post, shipping, logistics, delivery, and pick-up services. Post offices and other businesses that provide shipping and delivery services, and businesses that ship or deliver groceries, food, goods or services to end users or through commercial channels;
10. Educational institutions. Educational institutions including public and private pre- K-12 schools, and Haywood Community College for **purposes of facilitating distance learning, performing critical research related to COVID-19, or performing essential functions**, provided that social distancing of six feet per person is maintained to the greatest extent possible. This Proclamation is consistent with and does not amend or supersede NC Governor's March 10, 2020 Executive Order. The Haywood County School System remains under the command and control of the superintendent of schools.
11. Laundry services. Laundromats, dry cleaners, industrial laundry services, and laundry service providers;
12. Restaurants for consumption off-premises. Restaurants and other facilities that prepare and serve food, but only for consumption off-premises, through such means as in-house delivery, third-party delivery, drive-through, curbside pick-up, and carry-out. Schools and other entities that typically provide food services to students or members of the public may continue to do so under this Executive Order on the condition that the food is provided to students or members of the public on a pick- up and takeaway basis only. Schools and other entities that provide food services under this exemption shall not permit the food to be eaten at the site where it is provided, or at any other gathering site due to the virus's propensity to physically impact surfaces and personal property;
13. Supplies to work from home. Businesses that sell, manufacture, or supply products needed

for people to work from home;

14. Supplies for Essential Businesses and Operations. Businesses that sell, manufacture, or supply other Essential Businesses and Operations with the support or materials necessary to operate, including computers, audio and video electronics, household appliances; IT and telecommunication equipment; hardware, paint, flat glass; electrical, plumbing and heating material; sanitary equipment; personal hygiene products; food, food additives, ingredients and components; medical and orthopedic equipment; optics and photography equipment; diagnostics, food and beverages, chemicals, soaps and detergent; and firearm and ammunition suppliers and retailers for purposes of safety and security;
15. Transportation. Taxis, public transportation, transportation network providers (such as Uber and Lyft), vehicle rental services, paratransit, and other private, and commercial transportation and logistics providers necessary for Essential Activities and other purposes expressly authorized herein;
16. Home-based care and services. Home-based care for adults, seniors, children, and/or people with developmental disabilities, intellectual disabilities, substance use disorders, and/or mental illness, including caregivers such as nannies who may travel to the child's home to provide care, and other in-home services including meal delivery;
17. Residential facilities and shelters. Residential facilities and shelters for adults, seniors, children, and/or people with developmental disabilities, intellectual disabilities, substance use disorders, and/or mental illness;
18. Professional services. Professional services, such as legal services, accounting services, insurance services, and real estate services;
19. Childcare centers for specific employees exempted by this Proclamation. Childcare facilities providing services that enable first responders, healthcare workers, public health, HHS staff and others responding to COVID-19.
20. Manufacture, distribution, and supply chain for critical products and industries. Manufacturing companies, distributors, and supply chain companies producing and supplying essential products and services in and for industries such as pharmaceutical, technology, biotechnology, healthcare, chemicals and sanitization, waste pickup and disposal, agriculture, food and beverage, transportation, energy, steel and steel products, petroleum and fuel, mining, construction, national defense, communications, as well as products used by other Essential Businesses and Operations.
21. Hotels and motels. Hotels and motels, and other short-term lodging are to be governed by the specific rules set out in this Proclamation. In general, hotels and motels used to support Essential Services or activities are permitted to remain open and leisure or recreational lodging is prohibited.

22. Funeral services. Funeral, mortuary, cremation, burial, cemetery, and related services.

Minimum Basic Operations. For purposes of this Proclamation, Minimum Basic Operations include the following, provided that employees comply with Social Distancing Requirements, to the extent possible, while carrying out such operations:

1. The minimum necessary activities to maintain the value of the business's inventory, preserve the condition of the business's physical plant and equipment, ensure security, process payroll and employee benefits, or for related functions.
2. The minimum necessary activities to facilitate employees of the business being able to continue to work remotely from their residences.

Essential Travel. For purposes of this Proclamation, Essential Travel includes travel for any of the following purposes. Individuals engaged in any Essential Travel must comply with all Social Distancing Requirements as defined in this Section.

1. Any travel related to the provision of or access to Essential Activities, Essential Governmental Functions, Essential Businesses and Operations, or Minimum Basic Operations.
2. Travel to care for elderly, minors, dependents, persons with disabilities, or other vulnerable persons.
3. Travel to or from educational institutions for purposes of receiving materials for distance learning, for receiving meals, and any other related services.
4. Travel to and from the County to perform Essential Activities, to support Health Care and Public Health Operations, Human Service, Essential Infrastructure, Essential Governmental Functions, Essential Businesses and Operations and Minimum Basic Operations.
5. Travel required by law enforcement or court order, including to transport children pursuant to a custody agreement.
6. Travel required for non-residents to return to their place of residence outside the County. Individuals are strongly encouraged to verify that their transportation out of the County remains available and functional prior to commencing such travel.

Social Distancing Requirements. For purposes of this Proclamation, Social Distancing Requirements includes maintaining at least six-foot social distancing from other individuals, washing hands with soap and water for at least twenty seconds as frequently as possible or using

hand sanitizer, covering coughs or sneezes (into the sleeve or elbow, not hands), regularly cleaning high-touch surfaces, and not shaking hands. Attached to this proclamation is a summary of Social Distancing guidelines published by the Haywood County Health Department.

Residents returning to the county after non-essential travel outside the county for more than three days

Residents who are returning to their home in the County from outside the county after non-essential travel of more than three (3) days are to comply with a self-quarantine for 14 days after their entry into the county. During the 14-day self-quarantine period they should not leave their residence and they should follow the provisions of the CDC’s guidance on home isolation:

Residents who return to their home in the county who develop symptoms or who have been exposed or have come from an area of widespread virus should self-monitor their health (twice daily temperature checks, isolation from others in the household) during the 14-day self-quarantine, using the standards of the CDC guidance referenced above.

Rules for hotels and short-term lodging

- a. All lodging facilities, including campgrounds and direct-reservation facilities (such as AirBnb and VRBO) with rentals or leases for less than 15 days in duration shall be closed EXCEPT for work-related accommodations, facilities housing persons experiencing homelessness and any facility being used for isolation and quarantine purposes. Current residents at campgrounds are permitted to stay, but campgrounds should not allow new patrons to enter and establish themselves. Current residents at hotels, motels, and bed and breakfasts and other short-term rentals are permitted to stay, but these facilities should cancel any leisure travel reservations for the duration of this declaration. Any employees who work for a business or organization deemed essential can stay in any lodging.
- b. Visitors and property owners who are non-residents of Haywood County who are staying overnight as of the date of this action shall notify the Haywood County COVID-19 Hotline at 828-356-2019 to list with the County their most recent place of travel, length of stay and purpose for travel.

Required measures. Essential Businesses and Operations and businesses engaged in Minimum Basic Operations must take proactive measures to ensure compliance with Social Distancing Requirements, including where possible:

- 1. **Designate six-foot distances.** Designating with signage, tape, or by other means six- foot spacing for employees and customers in line to maintain appropriate distance;
- 2. **Hand sanitizer and sanitizing products.** Having hand sanitizer and sanitizing products readily available for employees and customers;

3. Separate operating hours for vulnerable populations. Implementing separate operating hours for elderly and vulnerable customers; and
4. Online and remote access. Posting online whether a facility is open and how best to reach the facility and continue services by phone or remotely.

This Proclamation is issued in accordance with, and incorporates by reference, the March 15, 2020 Proclamation of a Local State of Emergency and Proclamation of the State of Emergency issued by the Governor on March 10, 2020.

This Revised Proclamation will be valid through April 16, 2020 but will be regularly reviewed and evaluated and may be revised, amended, extended accordingly, based upon existing evidence and recommendations by the Public Health Director and Haywood County Office of Emergency Management.

Any person violating any prohibition or restriction imposed by this proclamation as authorized by the Proclamation of State of Emergency shall be guilty of a Class 2 misdemeanor in accordance with G.S. 14-288.20A.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Proclamation is for any reason held to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the Proclamation. The signatories hereby declare that it would have passed this Proclamation and each section, subsection, clause, and phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, or phrases be declared invalid.

This Proclamation is adopted in a meeting held March 26, 2020 and shall take effect on the 26th day of March, 2020 at 5:00 p. m.

Recommendations From Haywood County Health Department

THIS IS WHAT WE WOULD LIKE YOU TO DO TO BEST PROTECT YOUR FAMILY, NEIGHBORS, FRIENDS, YOURSELF, AND SOMEONE YOU DON’T EVEN KNOW

Don’t be a silent carrier of the virus:

- 1) if you have no symptoms and feel well, you may still have the virus and infect others.
 - a) social distancing- avoid gatherings and stay at least 6 feet away from others
 - b) hand washing for 20 seconds with soap and water after any outside contact,
 - c) clean frequently used surfaces with a solution of 1/3 cup bleach in 1 gallon of water

Don’t transmit the virus from those who might be sick:

- 2) Even if you feel well, if you have had contact with someone who has cough and/or fever,
 - a) quarantine by staying at home,
 - b) hand washing for 20 seconds with soap and water after any outside contact,
 - c) clean frequently used surfaces with a solution of 1/3 cup bleach in 1 gallon of water
 - d) contact call center described below or your personal health-care provider for advice.

Don’t transmit the virus if you have symptoms:

- 3) If you have cough, and/or fever, and/or fatigue,
 - a) avoid contact with anyone who has ongoing medical issues, especially heart, lung, cancer or immune system problems
 - b) isolate yourself by staying at home,
 - c) wear a mask
 - d) social distancing, stay at least 6 feet away from others, including your family
 - e) stay in a separate room and use a separate bathroom if possible
 - f) hand washing for 20 seconds with soap and water after any contact,
 - g) clean frequently used surfaces with a solution of 1/3 cup bleach in 1 gallon of water
 - h) contact call center described below or your personal health-care provider for advice.

Take these symptoms seriously:

- 4) If you have cough and/or fever, and/or fatigue, and THEN develop trouble breathing,
 - a) go to the emergency department
 - b) call 911
- 5) If you develop any symptoms that would have been concerning if there was no pandemic (like chest pain, abdominal pain, severe headache, weakness, passing out)
 - a) call 911

Reach for help for yourself or others

- 6) If you are having trouble with basic issues of living, such as getting food, medicine, etc.,
 - a) contact Haywood County Public Health Department at (828) 452-6675 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday (this is the regular Health Department number, for regular health department concerns)
 - b) for Covid-19 issues (to get advice, ask Covid-19 health questions and the like), call the Haywood County COVID-19 Call Center: (828) 356-2019. This number is answered seven days a week, from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.
- 7) This can be a scary time. It may seem that there is no way out of this, especially if you lose your job, or lose your connection with others. PLEASE remember this will pass, even if we just don't know when. If you feel that suicide is the only way out, PLEASE reach out to someone. Here is a phone number if you are feeling like harming yourself: 1-800-273-8255 (1-800-273-TALK).

CURRENT SITUATION WITH TESTING

For most patients, Covid-19 causes cough and/or fever for several days before trouble breathing and pneumonia develops (although some have had this happen faster). From the experiences of patients in other countries and in the United States, 80% recover with mild or no symptoms, 15% require some respiratory support, and 5% develop serious illness. The most serious cases seem to be persons over 60 and those whose health (especially breathing) is already weakened.

At this point, the ability to get results from testing remains very limited. Obtaining the specimen is not the challenge. As of March 18, 2020, it is taking 4-5 days to get results. During that time, the person tested needs to be in isolation (at home and away from other family members), so that the tested person and their family do not spread the virus, if they have it.

Right now, decisions about what you can do and about the need for medical care depends on whether you are having trouble breathing and the need for breathing support, not test results. Should the availability change, the role of testing might change too. If you have no symptoms,

- a) a negative test can only tell you what is going on at that moment. It does not mean you won't be positive in a day or two. Given the limited availability of testing, the best thing to do is follow the above measures in 1)

If you have symptoms,

- a) assume you have the virus and what you should do is isolate yourself and follow measures in 2). At this time, a test does not change this recommendation.

IN SUMMARY,

- a) social distancing, self-isolation, hand-washing
- b) seek care for trouble breathing
